

- The basic ingredients used separately or in combination to produce artistic imagery.






CLCMCNTS OF ART Line Shape **Form** Space Color Value **Texture**

Line

Artists use line to determine the edges of the images they're depicting. Lines can have different qualities.



Shape



Shapes are two-dimensional.
They can be geometric or organic.



Form





Form has depth, length, and width and resides in space. It is perceived as threedimensional.




Color

Color is light reflected off of objects. Color has three main characteristics: hue (the name of the color, such as red, green, blue, etc.), value (how light or dark it is), and intensity (how bright or dull it is).







Value


Value refers to the use of light and dark, shade and highlight, in an artwork.






Texture

Texture refers to the tactile qualities of a surface (how it feels)(actual) or to the visual representation of such surface qualities (implied).



Space



Space refers to the area and way in which art is organized.

Pattern

Pattern refers to the repetition or reoccurrence of a design element, exact or varied.



Contrast

The arrangement of opposite elements (light vs. dark, rough vs. smooth, large vs. small, etc.).



Emphasis

Emphasis refers to the created center of interest, the place in an artwork where your eye first lands.



Balance

Balance is the impression of equilibrium in a composition.

Not on the official list, but still a very important art word.






Harmony

Rhythm

Rhythm refers to the suggestion of motion through the use of various elements, establishing a visual beat.





Movement

Movement shows action. It often refers to the path the viewer's eye follows throughout the artwork. Indicating movement gives the artist the ability to control the viewer's eye.



Unity

Unity is achieved when the components of a work of art are perceived as harmonious, giving the work a sense of completion.
